LETTER FROM HENRIETTA

God's impossible plan

"By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as a wise builder, and someone else is building on it." 1 CORINTHIANS 3:10

Every day, I hear about impossibilities in the persecuted church. In human terms, the church shouldn't be growing in places where persecution is most extreme. In human terms, Christians who've suffered assault wouldn't choose to forgive their persecutors. In human terms, the gospel would never reach the most closed-off places on earth. But, every day, God does impossible things.

When I read Cho's* story of impossible faith (p8), I am reminded of 1 Corinthians 3:10-15. Cho has completed his ministry and gone to glory, but what he has built – faithfully taking the gospel to North Korean refugees – others will build upon. And Cho built on the truth of the gospel: "For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ." (1 Corinthians 3:11)

So we can pray big prayers. Let's keep praying the light into dark places. Let's pray for more of God's presence in the midst of extreme persecution – and for His church to keep growing, even where it looks impossible.

And as a new year begins, please also pray for fresh inspiration from the Holy Spirit for Open Doors. Please ask that we continue being guided to share the stories and requests of the persecuted church in a way that encourages people to reflect and respond – whether parliamentarians, Open Doors supporters, or those who've never heard of Christian persecution before. MALAYSIA

Truth and justice for the Kohs

Praise God that truth and justice have prevailed in Malaysia, with Susanna Koh winning her lawsuit against the state over the disappearance of her husband, Pastor Raymond Koh.

According to the judge, one or more police officials were involved in the abduction, acting 'oppressively and arbitrarily'. The government have been ordered to pay the family RM10,000 (£1,800) per day from the day Raymond was taken until he's found (current total more than £5.7 million). The police have been ordered to reopen the investigation into his disappearance.

"We're overjoyed and thankful to God that we have an honest and fair judgement," says Susanna, who's immensely grateful for your support and prayers.

PRAY That the reopened investigation will bring further resolution and justice.

INDIA Open doors for Kaveri

Thanks to you, Kaveri* (PICTURED) in India has a thriving clothing business that supports her family and enables her to share with others her greatest passion: Jesus.

Kaveri's faith journey began when she met Pastor Varum*. At the time, she was reeling from the absence of her husband, an alcoholic who left home and never returned. "As he talked about forgiveness, peace and hope, something stirred. I felt a peace I had never experienced," she recalls.

"What I am today is because of your prayers."

Kaveri started a prayer group, with 20 women gathering twice a week, but she was accused of forced conversions by Hindu extremists and arrested. After an awful ordeal, Pastor Varum got her

released. "Even in our darkest moments, God sends someone to guide us," say Kaveri.

Due to persistent hostility, Kaveri had to close her clothing business and relocate with her two children. Open Doors partners have since helped her open a new shop, given her persecution survival training and gifted her sewing machines to run a sewing centre for women.

"I'm truly grateful to the Open Doors partners who have supported me," she says. "What I am today is because of your prayers and support. Attending the training programme gave me the strength to move forward."

"God continues to open doors for me to witness about Him, and nothing will stop me – because He is in control."

MOZAMBIQUE

20 killed in attacks

At least 20 believers were killed after Islamist militants launched attacks on a Christian-majority village in Mozambique. Two churches and 1,300 homes were destroyed, and some 2,000 believers displaced.

The onslaught in Napala village – with al-Shabaab believed to be responsible – is the latest tragedy to affect Christians in the volatile Cabo Delgado province.

"The church in Mozambique is enduring deep trauma," a source told Open Doors. "Many believers and leaders live with fear, intimidation and emotional exhaustion. Although there remains a genuine desire to serve Christ, fear continues to weaken the church's public witness in many areas. But God is working in these hotspot areas."

IRAN

Convert injured in prison

An imprisoned convert in Iran has been denied proper medical care after falling from her bunkbed, fracturing her spine.

Aida Najafloo – whom many of you have been praying for – was taken to hospital, only to be returned to prison the same day, without the urgent surgery required. Aida already suffers from rheumatoid arthritis and her requests for a lower bed were ignored.

Aida is awaiting a court verdict on multiple charges, including 'collusion' for praying, performing baptisms and sharing Christian content online.

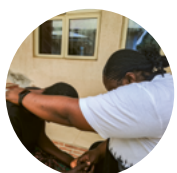

NIGERIA EMERGENCY APPEAL: THE LIFE-CHANGING DIFFERENCE YOU'RE MAKING

Thank you for enabling the distribution of life-saving relief parcels to Christians displaced by last year's devastating attack in Yelewata, Benue State. Virtue*, a local partner who helped distribute the aid, writes about what she saw, the immense impact of your support and how you can keep praying.



Virtue: When we arrived, the situation was still not good, because people are hungry. When you ask them what's the biggest problem, most say it's hunger.

The people are really traumatised and need psychological support. They

couldn't smile or sing. They were excited about the food, but you couldn't see it on their faces, because of the trauma they're carrying.

SEPARATED AND DISCOURAGED

In camp, we saw the separation of families. A husband and wife are staying in different places, and children are separated from their parents. Because of the way the camp is organised, women must stay in the same room with small children, but teenagers are in a separate place. It could lead to social, emotional and educational problems. They have a makeshift shelter for children to go to school. But how effective is it? That's the question I keep asking.

A lot of people are really discouraged about God. They'll tell you that they still

trust God, but they have this inner feeling that God isn't there. What's happened to them has really made them lose faith. "Can God really help me? Then why didn't He stop this?" Let's pray that God will strengthen their faith, that they will see Him even through their pains.

"THAT'S WHEN SHE LAUGHED"

There's a tuktuk driver who helps people in the camp. He has an aunt who is displaced. He explained how corruption stops the displaced from receiving food – he's seen it with his own eyes.

"I'm so happy with what you are doing," he told me. "This is the best way of sharing

food." I asked one woman if they are given food in the displacement camp. "Yes, but it's small," she said.

They are really grateful for the way we did the food parcels. They are going directly to families, although some decide to share with others, which we encouraged.

They were excited, they were happy. One of the ladies expressed shock: "Is this food really mine? Everything!?" It's been a while since they've seen food like this. They own it; it is theirs. "I'm so excited," she said. That's when she laughed. Before,

she couldn't even say anything. She lost seven people in her household.

YEARNING FOR HOME

Please pray that God will touch their hearts and give them comfort. Most have lost loved ones; many of them have lost livelihoods.

"We want to go back home," they say, after being asked how you can pray. "We're not used to living like this. We're used to working for what we eat. We're used to living in our own homes, no matter how bad the home is; it's still our home. We want to go back."

Let's pray for peace in Benue State, and in Nigeria, that people can go back to their homes and live in peace. Let's pray that God will bring help through the global church.

Is it possible for North Koreans to hear the gospel?

When Cho* first met Eun-Yeong*, she was hiding from him. She'd made one of the most dangerous journeys in the world – escaping from North Korea – and knew there could be spies looking to find people like her. If discovered, she'd be sent back to face interrogation, imprisonment and even death.

She was right about one thing. Cho was looking for people like her. But not for the reasons she feared.

“LEAVE US ALONE!”

“God be with you!” said Cho when he approached Eun-Yeong, putting his hands up to show he was unarmed. As he drew closer, he saw that she wasn't alone. Another figure was hidden behind a tree. Cho could tell by their dirty clothes and their exhausted, terrified faces that they had only recently escaped across the border.

“Get away from us!” shouted Eun-Yeong. “Leave us alone!”

Cho knew he had to keep her quiet: if they were heard by a passing guard or patrol, they'd all be punished severely. “I'm not here to hurt you,” he whispered urgently. “I want to help you. Please, don't shout – we don't know who is listening.”

Cho was here with a purpose. An impossible mission. Because he knew that, in human terms, it is impossible for North Koreans to

hear the gospel and choose to follow Jesus. He also knew that he followed the God of the impossible.

CHO'S PURPOSE

We're able to share Cho's story because his ministry is over. A few months ago, he sadly died from a long-term illness and he is now in glory. That's why it's safe to tell you about his extraordinary calling and his work as a secret Open Doors fieldworker.

"My purpose in life is to save souls," he

said simply. Every week, Cho – known by many as Evangelist Cho – hiked through the mountain forests to find the North Koreans who had risked everything to flee their country.

Christians in North Korea face extreme persecution. Even owning a Bible is enough to get you and your whole family thrown into prison for life. But Christians certainly aren't the only ones who suffer under the country's harsh dictatorship and dire shortages: every year, many North Koreans flee across the border to try to find food and work. And Cho tried to meet as many of them as he could.

"Every day, every week, every month and every year I return to the forest to help whoever I find," he said. "Because, with God, anything is possible."

VITAL FOOD

When North Koreans cross the border, they are usually desperate for food – so that's what Cho brings, to show he is a friend.

"Look here," he said to Eun-Yeong and the man with her, Cheol-Ho*, putting down his bag and backing away a few paces. "I have some food and water. It's yours." The desperate couple ate and drank, and began to trust Cho.

"There's also a tarp and some blankets in the bag,"

he added. "I'll come back again to bring you more food. It will be much safer for all of us if I come after dark, so no one is watching. Stay in the shelter until then and make sure you are not found."

The next day, Cho returned. This time he'd brought something even more precious than food.

A PRECIOUS BOOK

Using a headlamp to guide his path, Cho found the couple near where he'd first met them. He'd brought more food and water, and some blankets. As they ate, Cho could see something was troubling Eun-Yeong.

"Sir... can I ask you a question?" she asked. "You carry food around the mountains and you say you do this each week. There must be some reason. So – why do you do this?"

That was the opening Cho had waited for. "It's because of a man named Jesus," he said. "He's the son of God, and He loves you very much. In fact, I brought you a book that's all about Him." Cho pulled out a Bible, handing it to Eun-Yeong.

Immediately, the young woman shook her head. "I don't believe in God," she said. "We're grateful for the food, but we don't want anything to do with

superstition." She pushed the Bible back toward Cho.

"This book is yours to keep," he said. "Read it or don't read it – it's up to you."

He was used to this response. North Koreans often haven't heard of Jesus, but have been warned against Christians. The authorities say that Christians are spies who want to kidnap and abuse them. It can take time to break down this mistrust.

"I give a Bible to every North Korean I meet," Cho would say. "Sometimes they read it. Sometimes they refuse. My job is to tell people about Jesus. It's up to God to touch their hearts. And anything is possible with God."

"SOMETHING I NEED TO TELL YOU"

As often as he could, Cho returned to see Cheol-Ho and Eun-Yeong. One night, Eun-Yeong rushed towards him as he approached. "I have something I need to

tell you," she said. "I've been reading the book you gave us. Then yesterday, I had a dream. There was a person in my dream. He called me by my name. I think it was this 'Jesus' this book talks about, and I want to find out more about Him."

Cho was delighted! He began explaining the gospel: how Jesus lived, died and rose again to save humankind. They asked question after question, eager to learn more.

When he finally had to leave, he told them: "You know, if you really want to know all about Jesus, I can take you somewhere where there are more people from North Korea; people asking many of the same questions you have. Think about it and let me know tomorrow."

SAFE HOUSE

The next day, the couple were waiting when Cho arrived. They'd packed up their few belongings and were ready to join him at the safe house. "I was praying you would say that," he said.

The safe house where Cho took the couple is supported by Open Doors. At the house, North Koreans are cared for and given food and basic necessities. They're also invited to learn more about Jesus from Open Doors local fieldworkers, like Cho.

It was at the safe house that Eun-Yeong and Cheol-Ho dedicated their lives to Jesus! In human terms, it seems impossible that North Koreans would ever make this decision – but God used Open Doors fieldworkers to ensure it could happen.

But now that they were Christians, being caught and sent back to North Korea was even more dangerous. They might be executed. Even having met a Christian would mean their punishment would be more severe, let alone having chosen to defy the North Korean authorities and decide to follow Jesus themselves.

But Eun-Yeong and Cheol-Ho didn't have to be caught by spies. They chose to go back themselves.

What greater example of God's impossible plan

could there be? Despite the dangers, the courageous couple were determined to share their newfound faith with North Koreans desperately in need of the gospel.

A few months later, Cho received a coded message sent from North Korea. It simply said: "Our family has grown to five." Three more North Koreans had heard the gospel and chosen to follow Jesus!

Open Doors estimates there are more than 400,000 secret Christians in North Korea, risking their lives to follow Jesus. Thousands of believers are praying in whispers, asking God to do the impossible once again.

Interview: Open Doors secret fieldworker

Lydia Lee* shares what she sees in the North Korean church, and her experience of knowing Cho:

Q: WHAT HAS CHANGED IN NORTH KOREA THIS YEAR?

A: The overall situation remains largely unchanged. Hunger and malnutrition continue to plague the population, leading to many deaths throughout the year. North Koreans endure a life shaped by scarcity, surveillance and fear.

Christians cannot gather openly, worship freely or read the Bible. They are often betrayed, because reporting a Christian to the authorities can result in rewards like food, favour or social advancement. Despite these dangers, the underground church in North Korea is alive.

Q: WHAT HAPPENS WHEN NORTH KOREANS ESCAPE?

A: They may be disillusioned with the state, but the main reason they attempt to leave their country is simply survival for them and their families. Escaping has become far more dangerous. There is a high risk of capture and deportation back to North Korea, and the regime views defection as a serious crime. Returnees face severe punishments,

such as imprisonment, torture or even execution. Christians face the harshest fates.

Q: HOW DO OPEN DOORS FIELDWORKERS LIKE CHO HELP?

A: There are safe houses and shelters near the border to reach and support them with basic necessities, such as food, medicine and clothes. We offer thorough pastoral care, Bible training. It is a very special and precious moment for our workers to share Jesus.

In a world where no one could be trusted, Cho became the one person defectors knew they could rely on. He didn't need to perform miracles. His life was the miracle. To the forgotten, the hidden and the afraid, Cho became the hands and feet of Jesus. Through the quiet power of his life – through his actions, character and love – he deeply moved people and brought about real transformation in their lives.

Q: HOW CAN WE PRAY FOR NORTH KOREAN CHRISTIANS?

A: Ask the Lord to strengthen their hearts with unshakable peace, and to let their hidden faith burn like fire: alive, growing and unquenchable. Ask that His Word would continue to spread in miraculous ways, and that many in North Korea would come to witness His love and power.

Let's also lift up those who help North Korean believers and refugees outside of the country.

Pray that God would fill them with wisdom, strength, comfort and the unmistakable presence of the Holy Spirit. Pray specifically for the safe houses – that they would be sacred spaces of healing and refuge.

Your prayers matter. God hears every word. The underground church in North Korea is deeply grateful for your support and faithful intercession.

WELCOME TO A WORLD OF IMPOSSIBLE FAITH

The enemies of Christianity have one aim: to make it impossible to be a Christian.

They pass laws and spread rumours; they close down churches and create an atmosphere of fear and hatred. They do everything in their power to starve the church of oxygen, to scorch the earth so badly that the seeds of faith simply cannot grow.

There's only problem with this approach. It never works.

They silence the sermons, but Christians still tell others about Jesus. They close the churches, but Christians still find places to meet. They ban the Bible, so Christians memorise Scripture instead. They threaten believers with violence, yet Christians refuse to renounce their faith. They abuse anti-conversion laws, create a climate of fear. They put pastors in prison and drive

Christians out of their homes and communities. They do all they can to make the faith impossible, and yet still Christians persevere.

Against the odds, in refugee camps and prison cells, in houses and apartments, faith finds a way. Christianity has a habit of growing anywhere. 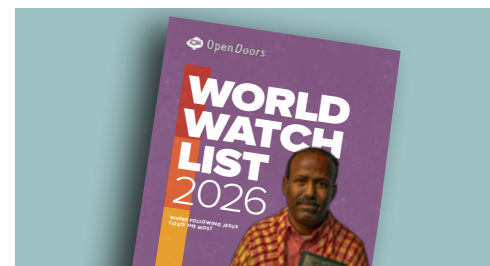

Aweis's story is not one we should know about. In Somalia, the church is invisible – hounded by violence, extremism and the fear of discovery. But Aweis's defiant ministry testifies to God's ability to do the impossible in one of the most dangerous places to be a Christian.

Aweis comes from an Islamic background and his father, a Muslim cleric, sought to make him his successor. But when Aweis inadvertently came across a Christian radio station one evening, his life began to change.

For native people, being Somali is synonymous with being Muslim. When Aweis heard a Somali proclaim

Jesus Christ, it was both strange and wonderful. In the following days, he kept tuning in to find out more about Jesus and asked the station for a New Testament. This was while the postal system was still working in Somalia, and he received it by post, not even considering what his family might think or the danger it could cause.

However, when Aweis shared his findings with his father, he received his first threat.

"My father said, 'I cannot stop you from reading your Bible,

but if you become a Christian, I will be the one to kill you.'"

From that time on, Aweis explored the Christian faith in secret.

REJECTED BY FAMILY

To become a Christian in Somalia is to turn one's back on one's entire clan. So, when Aweis became a Christian three years later, he was ejected from his tightly knit community and his life was transformed.

"My family refused to communicate with me, eat with me, spend time with me or include me in family dynamics and discussions. I was an outcast, someone who had defiled the family name," he says.

But Aweis never regretted his choice, finding deeper communion with Jesus in his suffering: "Every time I faced intensive persecution, I identified with Christ, and I felt closer to him."

FINDING FELLOWSHIP

For seven years, Aweis walked alone, clinging to Christ but increasingly overwhelmed by loneliness. His desperation drove him to talk to someone who he thought must be a Christian, despite the risk.

Through this step of faith, he found a fellow believer. Such a discovery in Somalia is effectively impossible, but for Aweis, God had made the impossible possible.

Together, they started looking for more believers. Little by little, their community grew, and they reached 14. "It was the happiest time I'd had, since I'd come to the Lord," Aweis explains.

REMNANT BELIEVERS

However, it wasn't long before persecution began to catch up with them.

Members of the church began to receive visions of persecution. Yet, in one of these visions, a believer said that he heard a voice from a bright light say to him,

"Do not be afraid. You will not be eliminated; you will not be wiped out. Some of you will remain. You will become stronger."

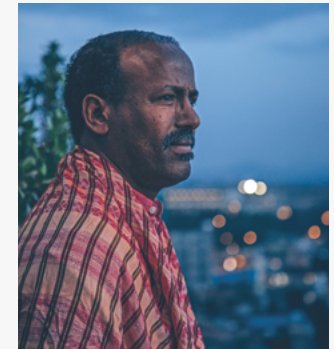
One by one, the Christians were hunted down and killed. In the end, only two were left: Aweis and another believer. The rest were martyred for their faith in Jesus.

GLORY IN SUFFERINGS

What he had experienced was so painful that Aweis decided to leave the country to recover. In the Lord's kindness, he received theological training to continue the work God had begun through him.

Today, Aweis diligently pursues his work in biblical translation and pastoral care for Somali believers in the Horn of Africa. He believes in the importance of discipleship and trauma care for his brothers and sisters, working for the day when the Somali church will be a bright presence amongst its communities.

Ultimately, the true impossibility for Aweis is stopping the work of the gospel. He testifies with boldness, "There is no place where Christ cannot be followed. It's impossible. The Holy Spirit can penetrate every wall."



LISTEN

"Now if we are children, then we are heirs – heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory." (Romans 8:17)

LINGER

Amidst isolation and threats, Aweis clung to Jesus. How can you remind yourself that in suffering, you have communion with Jesus?

LIVE

Wherever Somali Christians are, following Jesus comes at a high cost. Where are you being called to be a bold witness for Him?

PRAY

- For Somali believers and their discipleship, that they may be equipped in the face of persecution
- For healing for those who have endured traumatic experiences, that they would trust the promise of glory in suffering with Christ.
